

What Changed After I Decided to Study in China?



Then people ask me what it's like to earn a four-year degree in China taught entirely in Mandarin, my answer is: "Easier than you might imagine and tougher than you can possibly believe." In truth, it's also far more rewarding than one might think.

Generally speaking, people's world views are shaped by the environment in which they live. For me, a shy homeschooled kid coming from a small town in America, I saw the world from a very narrow point of view. During the first few years here in China, the hardest part about living and studying in such a challenging environment was accepting the changes in myself brought about by constant interactions with a culture and a world view drastically different than my own. Being part of Chinese society was not about changing my world view or my ideals to fit in, it was about opening my mind up to learning from another language and seeing the world through the eyes of another culture. This is, after all, the point of an education, is it not?



Ultimately it was the decision to let myself accept changes within myself that became the defining moment of my studies in China, and perhaps of my entire life. My initial plan of spending three months studying Mandarin in Beijing quickly became seven, and soon after I changed my educational direction to a business major. Two years later, the shy young man who had walked hesitatingly through the school's south gate was nowhere to be seen. He had been transformed into someone new altogether: a far more outgoing person with a focus and direction. This "new me" was entering language competitions, hosting university events, and being interviewed by Chinese media.

There are four highlights that I distinctly remember, marking the improvements made in my linguistic ability. The first was around four months after my arrival when I had my first, albeit simple, conversation with a Chinese friend entirely in Mandarin. The second was the first time I dreamed in Chinese. The third, a taxi ride in my second year where I discussed politics with the driver, who didn't speak a word of English. The final highlight came in my third year when my wife and I were at a Chinese blind massage parlor. Thirty minutes into the massage, and after I had spent most of the time chatting with the masseuse, my wife asked her where she thought I was from. She guessed China's northern region, based on the accent. When my wife informed her that I was in fact Caucasian American, her disbelief encouraged me to no end.

In my opinion, for anyone who is considering studying in China, the right questions are not, "Will it land me a good job? Will I become fluent? Isn't learning Chinese incredibly difficult?" But rather, "Can I accept the changes within myself and the way I will see the world?"

Your answer to that question will determine the amount of effort you put into your studies, and by extension, become a determining factor in the level of your success.

The following are some helpful tips for those considering a Chinese education:

- First and foremost, you can do this! While becoming truly fluent in Chinese (and any other language for that matter) is a task that requires years of devotion, it is absolutely possible. It depends mostly on your ability to push yourself and accept personal changes.
- Don't be afraid to try. While the idea of traveling halfway around the world is a daunting one, it is one I believe no one will regret. What you learn here will stay with you forever and may just be the highlight of your life.
- It doesn't matter if you are from a small town or a blg city, when you arrive in China it is as if you are starting anew. The opportunities available to a small-town kid are no different than those to someone from a blg city.
- Just as you set your own limit, it is you who gives yourself the opportunity to come to China.
